Twenty-five company officers graduated from the <u>Fire Officer Academy:</u> <u>The Company Officer</u> on Friday, October 6, 2023.

Acceptance into the in-person portion of the program was not easy; the initial application required a resume and cover letter, and students were then tasked with dozens of hours of online assessments that the Selection Committee used to make the final roster. From the start, competition was fierce. We received over 60 applications for OA 23-02 and the details in resumes, cover letters, and online assignment submissions were the difference makers.



#### Quarterly is in less than 2 weeks!



### **FSIC course spotlight: Make the Grab**


One of the top priorities during fire emergencies *must be aggressive search*.


Firefighters and company officers have a duty to enter the premises, conduct a thorough search, rescue the victim, and ensure their safety. While the topic of searching is a hot topic, training on how to search effectively is limited.

This class delves into tactics and search methods that can improve speed and efficiency on the fire ground. Topics include victim drags, carries, and other removal techniques that are not typically covered in training. Additional skills covered include large area search, ground ladders, oriented search, VES, locating victims with the TIC, and searching with the water can.

This class goes beyond the basics and emphasizes how the fire service can uphold its oath to prioritize saving lives and search with a sense of purpose.



#### From the Red Cross: Home Fire Risk Map

The Home Fire Risk Map from the American Red Cross is getting an update soon.

This data visualization supports the Home Fire Campaign in an effort to reduce the number of deaths and injuries caused by home fires. The current map, built by DataKind DC in 2016, helped the Red Cross and local fire departments target high-risk communities for fire safety education and free smoke alarm installations.

The *About* section reads in part: This project uses machine learning techniques that leverage data from the U.S. Census, the American Red Cross and the National Fire Incident Reporting System to predict aggregate neighborhood home fire risk based on the following criteria:

- Risk No Smoke Alarm: The increased likelihood that homes within a census tract lack functioning smoke alarms.
- Risk Home Fire: The prevalence of home fires in a census tract over a 5-year period.
- Risk Fire-Related Injury: The increased likelihood that a home fire could result in an injury or death.
