Historical Spotlight: Chief Eddie Rivers

Eddie Rivers didn't grow up in the fire service. He joined the military when he was of-age and moved back to Pageland where he worked for his dad's laundry and dry-cleaning business after his time serving the country.

The fire department was across the street from the laundromat, intriguing the young veteran. When Eddie asked the chief about joining, he was told he needed to grow up before he was ready. After a few years running calls, they accepted him as one of their own.

"When I initially joined, we didn't put out many fires... we attempted to put them out, but we didn't have the skills nor equipment to do the job we needed to do," Chief Rivers said. "That's when we realized we needed to develop some training skills and get some better equipment."

When the Pageland Fire Department reorganized in 1966, Eddie had been on the department for 3 years. It was then that he was elected chief of the department.

Chief Rivers grew into the role and found himself on the big stage at the State House when he was appointed by Gov. **Richard Riley** to serve on the State Fire Commission. **Richard Mincey**, former Association lobbyist, is credited with getting Chief Rivers involved on the state level.

"In working with Richard over those years, he asked me one day if I would be interested in serving on a state board... so, in a short period of time, I was asked if I would serve on the State Fire Commission," Chief Rivers said. "It makes me feel real good to know that I had some small part in trying to improve the services of our fire service throughout the state."

In addition to his statewide service, Chief Rivers has given back to the community that raised him by serving on County Council for 35 years. All 3 of his sons joined the fire service when they were old enough, with his son, Tommy, currently serving as fire chief; 3 of his grandsons are firefighters, too.

Chief Rivers' advice to the upcoming generation remains true to his servant heart: it's not about serving you, it's about serving other people.

Departments in Good Standing: Congratulations!

In order for a department to be in Good Standing with the Association, several items must be completed before the assigned deadline. Our Constitution and By-Laws states for a department to be in Good Standing they must:

- Select and confirm their voting members by January 1st
- Remit SCSFA Dues by January 1st
- Submit all required forms (Form 206 & 207) by January 31st
- For departments that are required to have an audit, they must obtain a passing grade

Member departments in Good Standing that have met their requirements to be eligible to receive this year's current 1% distribution from their County Treasurer are listed on our website.

Coming to a screen near you: PTSD911

We know that PTSD is rampant in emergency services. First responders see and experience levels of trauma the average person will never fully understand.

PTSD911 is a documentary about first responders and the lingering issues from repeat trauma. According to the documentary website, "PTSD911 will provide information about a path forward from PTSD that does not lead to suicide, but rather leads to return to a fulfilling life that involves serving others. Fire, Police, EMS, and 911 operators all came into their respective professions to help others. They want nothing more than to be able to return whole to their jobs. But, in the circumstance of PTSD, help is needed for healing. Department leaders need to develop programs and policies to help their members. This takes education and awareness, which PTSD911 will provide. Also, the responders need to know there is help available, which will be another critically important message in this film."

South Carolina First Responders Assistance and Support Team has partnered with ConjoStudios, LLC to show the film in Columbia on Thursday, September 28 at 7 p.m. at Calvary Chapel Northeast; a second showing is scheduled in Greenville on Friday, September 29 at 7 p.m. at Boiling Springs Station 15. Both screenings will feature a Q&A with documentary director Conrad Weaver and members of the public safety community in the area.
