

**The 2nd regular session of the 126th South Carolina General Assembly
convened on Tuesday, January 13, 2026**

Governor of South Carolina is Henry McMaster (R – Richland) since January 24, 2017. His current term ends on January 13, 2027.

The South Carolina Legislature is divided into two parts called bodies (The House of Representatives and the Senate) and combined the bodies form the General Assembly.

House of Representatives

- Speaker of the House is Murrell Smith (R – Sumter) since May 12, 2022
- Speaker Pro Tempore – Tommy Pope (R – York)
- Majority Leader is Davy Hiott (R–Pickens)
- Minority Leader is Todd Rutherford (D– Richland)
- 124 seats
- 2 year terms (next election Tuesday, November 3, 2026)
- Currently there are Republicans (88); Democrats (36)
- Qualifications: qualified to vote in state elections; 21 years of age; a resident of the district in which he/she seeks to represent; has not been convicted of or pled guilty to a felony or voter fraud or bribery unless 15 years has elapsed since time was served.

Senate

- President of the Senate is Thomas Alexander (R – Oconee) since December 6, 2021
- Majority Leader is Shane Massey (R – Edgefield)
- Minority Leader is Brad Hutto (D – Orangeburg)
- 46 senators
- 4 year terms (next election November 7, 2028)
- Currently there are - Republicans (34); Democrats (12)
- Qualifications: qualified to vote in state elections; 25 years of age; a resident of the district in which he/she seeks to represent; has not been convicted of or pleaded guilty to a felony or voter fraud or bribery unless 15 years has elapsed since time was served.

126th Session of the South Carolina General Assembly - 2nd Regular Session (2026)

- Members of the bodies convened on Tuesday, January 13, 2026 (second Tuesday in January)
- This is the second year of a two-year session
- Legislation not enacted during the 2025 session will hold its place in the legislative process and carry over to the 2026 session
- RULES DELETED: The crossover deadline rule was deleted January 31, 2025 by the House of Representatives and December 4, 2024 by the Senate.
- Statutory Sine Die date – Thursday, May 14, 2026 (second Thursday in May) unless an extension is agreed to by a two-thirds vote of both bodies. Normally, the House and Senate meet in statewide session on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday and for local matters on Friday. The Governor may call the General Assembly into a special session if necessary, beyond the regular session. [S.238 \(Sine Die Resolution\)](#) The resolution gives lawmakers extra time to finish the state budget by automatically extending the legislative session and allowing leaders to call the House and Senate back specifically for budget work.

SC State Firefighters’ Association FY26-27 Budget Request

SUMMARY of FUNDING and PROVISOS

- **SCFAST** - Received additional funding of \$287,029 from the House and Senate.
- **Palmetto 800** - Received an additional \$4.2 million recurring and \$13.4 million nonrecurring from the House and less from the Senate at \$2.1 million recurring and \$3.5 million nonrecurring.
- The Firefighter **Cancer Benefit Plan** was fully funded \$1.181 million recurring in the Senate version.
- SCSEFA continues to pursue \$4.8 million nonrecurring for the **Heritage Center**.
- **Provisos of Interest:**
 - 1.126 (**Mobile Panic Alert System**) directs that each public school district and charter school implement a panic alert system. This provision was adopted by the Senate.
 - 108.13 - (**Return to Work - 12 month Separation and No Cap**) is an existing 12 - month separation provision and has been adopted by the House and Senate.
 - 108.18 - (**Return to Work - 90 Day Separation and \$80K Cap**) was added by the Senate and reduces the separation period to 90 days, \$80K salary cap and directs that a returning member is unable to return to work in a supervisory position.
 - 117.197 - (**Aid to Fire Districts**) creating a separate fund for fire district funding has been adopted by the House and Senate.

117.199 (**Building Code/Fire Code Exceptions in Hospitals**) In Certain Emergency Situations, Beds Can Be Placed In A Hall Or Corridor. Adopted by the Senate.

117.200 - (**Statewide First Responder Interoperability**) moves the Pal800 statewide radio system coordination to the State Law Enforcement Division (SLED). The South Carolina State Firefighters' Association was added to the provision by the Senate.

SCSFA REQUEST DETAIL

REQUEST 1(A) - South Carolina Firefighter Assistance Support Team (SCFAST) - \$287,028.62 (General Funds - Recurring) The focus of SCFAST is twofold, prevention and post-incident support. SCFAST was authorized and funded by the General Assembly in 2016 through the Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation via a budget proviso (81.13). The proviso allows the fire service to offer preventative initiatives and obtain an insurance policy that covers the out-of-pocket expenses associated with clinical care for mental or behavioral health needs of the first responder. **REQUEST 1(B):** The SCSFA also requests that the funding for the SCFAST program be broken out as a line item in LLR's budget (as currently done in SLED's budget for PTSD Treatment).

REQUEST 2 - Palmetto 800 Statewide Radio System Funding - \$5.5 million is estimated to cover approximately 50% of user fees (General Funds - Recurring) and a total of approximately \$97 million or roughly \$20 million over a 5-year phase-in for infrastructure (General Funds - Nonrecurring). The goal for FY26-27 is to reach a 50% match from the state for user fee costs for those eligible public safety and first responders outlined in Proviso 93.7 in the Appropriations Act. The fire service would like to encourage the Governor to request retaining the Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) non-deployment surplus funds and allocate a portion towards building radio towers throughout the state in order to provide adequate coverage for portable radios. If BEAD funding is unavailable, then the fire service would encourage the General Assembly to include funding in the FY26-27 Appropriations bill. Each tower is **estimated** to cost \$2 million which is **estimated** to cost approximately \$94 million or an estimated \$20 million over a five-year phase-in. The South Carolina State Firefighters' Association worked with House and Senate members regarding the Palmetto800 statewide radio budget request.

REQUEST 3 - South Carolina Heritage Center and Museum Request - \$4.8 million (General Funds - Nonrecurring) - The SCSFA is requesting funding consideration for the development of the South Carolina State Fire Heritage Center and Museum. Currently, there is no statewide facility designated to educate future generations on South Carolina's fire service history. The SCSFA purchased a facility in the vicinity of Columbia, located in Richland County, which will house the South Carolina State Fire Heritage Center and Museum. The SCSFA is seeking funding (\$4,800,000) necessary to renovate approximately 25,000 sq ft of the property to include an interactive fire museum, auditorium and educational center. Additionally, the Heritage Center will have the capability to also serve as a Firefighter Mobilization back-up staging location, in the center of the state, for natural disaster response. *SCSFA continues to meet with members regarding funding the South Carolina Heritage Center and Museum.*

SCSFA continues to support the FY26-27 State Fire Budget Request submitted by the South Carolina Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation. The Firefighter Cancer Benefit Plan received additional \$1.181 million in the Senate Version of the Budget Bill..

PROVISOS OF INTEREST

1.126. (SDE: Panic Button) *The state requires all public school districts and charter schools to use allocated funds to implement a mobile panic alert system in every school. This system must connect various emergency service technologies to enable real-time coordination among local and state law enforcement and first responders, integrate with existing 911 infrastructure, and include initial training for school personnel and resource officers. Districts must also use the state's school mapping data program, which must be accessible to any qualified vendor. The education department, in consultation with state law enforcement agencies, must identify and publish a list of approved vendors by the end of the fiscal year. Districts or schools that already have a compliant mobile panic alert system are exempt from these requirements.*

108.13. (PEBA: PORS and SCRS Return to Work) Provides that retired members of the SCRS and PORS A retired member of the Police Officer Retirement System can return to work and earn compensation **without being subject to the usual earnings limitation** if: They have **not worked for any participating employer** in the system—or any other retirement system under Title 9—in **any capacity** (employee, contractor, leased worker, etc.) for **at least 12 consecutive months after retiring**. They **certify** to the system that they meet this 12-month break requirement. If the member **incorrectly certifies** that they qualify for the exemption, they must **repay any benefits** they received that they were not entitled to.

108.18. (PEBA: Retired Member of PORS) A retired Police Officers Retirement System (PORS) member who has been out of service for at least **90 consecutive days** may return to a PORS-covered job. They can earn **up to \$80,000 per year** without reducing their monthly PORS retirement benefit. However, if the officer retired from a **supervisory rank**, they are **not allowed to return to a supervisory position**. Any time worked after returning does **not add new service**.

117.197. (GP: Aid to Fire Districts Fund) Creates the Aid to Fire Districts Fund, separate from the state General Fund. That portion of fire premium tax revenues and the state portion of the broker premium tax revenues that are required by statute to be distributed to county treasurers for local fire service must be deposited in the fund. Also, the Department of Insurance must ensure that the fund has an appropriate balance, and the state treasurer shall distribute the fund's revenues in the fund to the county treasurers.

117.199. (GP: Hospital Emergency Bed Placement) Allows hospitals, during a “justified emergency,” to temporarily place patient beds in hallways, corridors, or other exit pathways even if that would normally violate building or fire codes. This is only permitted when a designated emergency department leader determines that all standard treatment spaces have been exhausted and that patient safety would be at risk without using these additional areas, and this determination must be documented within seven days using a Department of Public Health form. Hospitals are required to record key details about each emergency, maintain these records, and submit them at least quarterly to the Department of Public Health. They must also remove beds from these areas once the emergency ends, ensure that hallways and exits remain clear and do not obstruct fire safety systems, and develop written protocols that staff are trained to follow. The Department of Public Health oversees compliance and enforcement. A “justified emergency” includes events such as disasters, disease outbreaks, mass casualty incidents, or situations where emergency department capacity is overwhelmed.

117.200. (GP: First Responder Interoperability) **117.200. (GP: First Responder Interoperability)** The original proviso directs SLED to administer and coordinate First Responder Interoperability operations for the statewide Palmetto 800 radio system to enhance public safety radio communications. Appropriated funds will cover radio user fees for eligible state agencies and first responders, with allocations based on a minimum number of radios per participant. Grants will be available for county and municipal systems to improve interoperability but are subject to a required matching of funds to receive support. Any remaining funds may be used to expand the statewide Palmetto 800 system. The Senate amended the proviso to require SLED to consult with the Department of Administration, the Department of Public Safety, SCEMD, a representative from the Police Chief's Association, a representative from the South Carolina Sheriff's Association, **a representative of the South Carolina State Firefighter's Association**, and a representative of the South Carolina Emergency Medical Services Association to establish a baseline number of radios used by each Palmetto 800 participant based on criteria such as the jurisdictional requirements of each respective participant or association.
