Firefighters from around the state met last week at the State House to speak to their legislators and unify the fire service voice with concentration on several legislative actions that effect the fire service as part of the South Carolina State Firefighters' Association annual **Legislative Day**.

Association President **Josh Holzheimer** welcomed firefighters, legislators, and staff to a focused event to draw attention to safety and protection needs of fire service personnel, both volunteer and career, during the annual meeting. Firefighters met with both House and Senate members and offered directed thoughts on several bills and their thanks for supporting the fire service back home and throughout South Carolina.

Topics of conversation included: V-SAFE funding, Palmetto 800 funding, PTSD and the Workforce, Line of Duty Death benefits, Fire Drills in Schools, and Right of Way.

The Executive Committee and staff want to extend an enormous thank you the legislators and their staffs who took the time out of their schedules to eat and fellowship. In addition, Legislative Day would be impossible without firefighters from all over the state making the trip to Columbia to participate. Fire Safe South Carolina names Fire Safe communities

Fire Safe South Carolina announced last week the departments designated as a Fire Safe community. 132 departments across the state were named in a <u>press release</u> from Fire Safe South Carolina. The program aims to reduce fire-related injuries, promote consistent fire safety messaging, and stress the importance of collecting accurate fire scene data. Fire Safe South Carolina was launched in 2017 in a partnership between the Firefighters' Association, South Carolina State Association of Fire Chiefs, South Carolina Fire Marshal Association, South Carolina Chapter of the International Association of Fire Investigators, and South Carolina State Fire.

"Nearly one million citizens were educated last year on ways to stay fire safe thanks to the commitment and dedication of our 132 Fire Safe South Carolina fire departments and our community partners," Community Risk

Reduction Chief **Josh Fulbright** said in the announcement. "The efforts will not stop there as we continue to work together to educate more people and make South Carolina fire safe."

Fire Safe South Carolina departments will be recognized during a ceremony at <u>Fire-Rescue</u> in June.

News from the State House



Legislative Upate

Each week when the legislature is in session, Association lobbyists Stewart, Konduros, and Associates provide an update on legislation that impacts the fire service. All Legislative Updates for current session are posted on our website.

Today we're looking at the Senate Bill 81.

S 81 (Workers' Compensation- PTSD) By Malloy. Provides that a limitation on stress, mental injuries, and mental illness for workers' compensation does not apply to a first responder (fire and law enforcement) diagnosed with post-traumatic stress disorder. Referred to Judiciary. A subcommittee

meeting on S 81 was held on Tuesday, April 4, 2023 and the bill was not reported out. A similar bill S251 which was also on the agenda was reported out favorably.
